University of Saskatchewan to undertake excavations at Fort Carlton Provincial Park in 2022! University students mapped, surveyed and began excavations in May and June. The SAS is continuing these excavations throughout July and August.

Fort Carlton was a Hudson's Bay Company trading post in operation from 1810-1885. The archaeological excavations are taking place west of the reconstructed Fort. To date, excavators have uncovered bison bones, metal, glass, charcoal, buttons, ceramic fragments, and some small beads.

Saskatoon: Ancient Pathways, A Bison Biography (until August 2022) - Wanuskewin Heritage Park Toured by the Kauffman Museum on behalf of the National Buffalo Foundation, this exhibit explores the significance of bison in the cultures of Plains Indian peoples—particularly as a resource for food, clothing, shelter and tools. That co-existence changed dramatically with the closing of the frontier that brought new settlers with livestock to compete for grass and water during a time of climate and habitat change. These developments were exacerbated by the commodification of the bison as hide and bone in late nineteenth century industrialization. The exhibit embeds the bison in the larger narrative of human interactions with natural resources that represent an historical awareness of the need for sustainability—a critical theme in our global economic and cultural discussions. By focusing on bison as a shared resource, Bison illuminates the past and present of this great North American mammal as a vibrant part of our future. Saskatoon: Iron Willed - Women in STEM (until August 28, 2022) - Diefenbaker Canada Centre (101 Diefenbaker Place)

Do women and girls, as well as their parents, educators, and employers, see themselves equitably represented in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) fields? Women have made significant contributions to STEM – and continue to do so – but their stories are often untold. Why is that? This travelling display shares some of these stories and provides recognition for the crucial role of women in STEM. Through text and images, the exhibit from Ingenium-Canada's Museums of Science and Innovation tells the stories of historical and contemporary women in STEM, their scientific contributions as well as their challenges in the face of persistent systemic barriers. Exhibit is displayed in both English and French.

Saskatoon: Maanipokaa'iini (until September 5, 2022) - Remai Modern (102 Spadina Crescent East) Maanipokaa'iini is the first-ever survey of the work of the Siksika Nation artist Adrian Stimson. Across installation, painting, photography, video and live performance, Stimson re-signifies colonial history through humour and counter-memory. The exhibition features significant works from Stimson's nearly 20-year practice that explore identity construction, the centrality of the bison to Blackfoot spirituality and survival, and the intergenerational impacts of the residential school system. These interconnected areas of focus form an encompassing vision wherein the fraught history of Indigenous-settler relations on the

of four petroglyphs near the Newo Asiniak buffalo jump site, and the reintroduction of bison at Wanuskewin in 2019. The title of the exhibition, Maanipokaa'iini, is the Blackfoot word for newborn bison, and was chosen following the birth of a bison late in the season at Wanuskewin in September 2021, when Stimson was an artist-in-residence. The title further evokes a sense of renewal and futurity that informs the new work.

Saskatoon: Biting Back - Our Cultural Resilience (until October 2022) - Wanuskewin Heritage Park The art exhibit will be a collection of wearable art that will be displayed on mannequins to host a fully embodied presentation. Each piece will have an original birch bark biting design envisioned and created by the artist Half Moon Woman. Utilizing contemporary technologies, such as laser etching, the exhibit will transpose these bitings onto traditional materials such as hide, fur, bone and metals creating head to toe looks. The original birch bark bitings will be exhibited alongside the contemporary wearable art pieces. This show will be pushing the boundaries on the intersection of ancient cultural art forms, modern technologies and the occupation of contemporary spaces. There will be 13 pieces telling the story of Indigenous people through time starting with pre contact to colonialism and into the future. This collection will be a story of survival, resilience, and hope; the story of Indigenous people across Turtle Island and the world. Pat Bruderer - Half Moon Woman represents the preservation of a very special type of indigenous art. The art form is called Birch Bark Bitings and Pat is one of the few knowledge keepers and expert practitioners of this ancient Indigenous art. She was born and raised in Churchill, Manitoba, Canada and is of Cree ancestry. She is a member of the Peter Ballantyne Cree Nation who are Assin'skowitiniwak or Rocky Cree. She is the mother of five children, is a proud Kookum to her grandchildren and currently resides in British Columbia, Canada. Half Moon has always been an active community member, teaching art, volunteering, and creating programs to assist Indigenous communities in Canada. Half Moon Women, is self-taught in the art form but was highly inspired by the work of Angelique Merasty of Flin Flon, Manitoba. Half Moon feels great responsibility as a carrier of this traditional art form, and strives for it's preservation, and for the teachings that it holds; something she calls 'Passing a Tradition.' Saskatoon: In the Middle of Everywhere - Artists on the Great Plains (until February 26, 2023) - Remai Modern (102 Spadina Crescent East)

Located in the geographic middle of North America, the Great Plains encompass a vast territory framed by forests to the north, mountains to the west, and great rivers to the east and south. Remai Modern is situated on the grasslands of the northern Great Plains region. The largest ecosystem on the continent, the plains support an extensive network of living relations. Deep forms of kinship, inherited histories and economic and political systems bind people to this geography. A space of subtle beauty, surprising diversity, and overwhelming openness, the plains are physically and conceptually expansive in ways that are not easily defined. In the Middle of Everywhere is part of an ongoing inquiry that seeks to trace the physical, social and psychological contours of the Great Plains. The work of the participating artists helps us to bring this outline of place into focus. They reach across time and location, working in a wide variety of media, and with distinct voices. Their work connects around themes that recur across the exhibition: the geography of the Great Plains; histories of movement and migration; living with the land; the prevalence of the grid in Plains culture; and the Nēhiyaw concept of Wahkohtowin (kinship). Following topographical features rather than political boundaries, this exhibition reorients the museum to the Great Plains and asks: What makes this place itself? Saskatoon: On Safari Downtown Saskatoon Tour - With fossils and more (Ongoing) - Online

This guide, created by the Museum of Natural Sciences at the University of Saskatchewan, will help you to find all kinds of surprises in downtown Saskatoon. We will see many animal and plant stone carvings, and there are other animals and plants hiding inside the stones! Many of the buildings use a special type of limestone known as Tyndall Stone, a sedimentary rock that was built up over time trapping the remains of animals and plants which have been preserved as fossils. Although some of the buildings downtown are already 100 years old, the stones used for these buildings are much older. Tyndall Stone is the remains of an ancient sea floor from 450,000,000 years ago. Born in Saint-Boniface, Red River Settlement in 1844, Riel led two popular Métis governments, is considered the father of Manitoba, and was a central figure the Red River and North-West resistances in 1870 and 1885 respectively. Riel was tried in Regina for high treason for his role in the 1885 Resistance to Canadian encroachment on Métis lands. He was found guilty and executed at the North-West Mounted Police barracks (now RCMP Academy, Depot Division) on November 16, 1885. Once dismissed as a rebel, Riel is now considered a Canadian hero – a passionate and renowned Métis leader who spoke up and fought to protect his people from the Canadian government. We invite you to explore this online gallery while we are closed to the public, featuring history, artifacts and sound clips of Saskatchewan stories during the 1918-19 Spanish Flu pandemic.

people. The original exhibit can be found in the Winning the Prairie Gamble gallery at the WDM Saskatoon. We recognize this is not a comprehensive history of the Spanish Flu in Saskatchewan. Rather, it is a sampling how people coped, what they worried about and how they persevered. We recognize that not everyone's histories are represented here. There is great need for more research on the impacts of the Spanish Flu in First Nations and Métis communities in Saskatchewan. Historians do know that the pandemic had devastating effects on Indigenous communities, exacerbated by colonial policies that already contributed to lower social determinants of health.

This exhibit is a tribute to Dr. Shadd and his work. Dr. Alfred Schmitz Shadd was the first person of African ancestry known to settle in what is now Saskatchewan. The WDM would like to thank the <u>Saskatchewan African Canadian Heritage Museum Inc.</u> and the <u>Melfort & District Museum</u> for working with us on this virtual exhibit.

North Battleford: Refuge Canada (until August 27, 2022) - Highways 16 and 40

Refuge Canada is on exhibit at the WDM North Battleford from June 4 through August 27, 2022. Refuge Canada is a travelling exhibition created by the Canadian Museum of Immigration at Pier 21 and is supported by TD Bank Group. Refugees face fear, shattered lives and often dangerous voyages in search of refuge. Canada has provided that refuge for many. However, over the course of the 20th century, Canada has had a mixed record of welcoming refugees, reacting generously to some while overlooking others. Refuge Canada provides context for Canada's place in the global refugee crisis and brings to light the challenges faced by people who came to Canada as refugees. Drawing upon oral histories, archival images, artifacts and interactives, Refuge Canada shares the stories of refugees in an evocative and engaging way. The exhibition aims to create a setting for visitors to make a personal connection to the feelings of pain, danger and hope experienced by refugees, and to be inspired and informed on refugee issues in Canada today. Refuge Canada is organized into five themes: Life Before - No one chooses to be a refugee and all kinds of people can become one. Refugees leave their homes, families and jobs behind when they are forced to flee. A dramatic depiction of the ruins of a past life will introduce visitors to this experience; Fear - Fear, one of the most primal of human emotions, is central to the experience of refugees. It is also a key part of the United Nations definition of a refugee: "A refugee has a well-founded fear of persecution...." Compelling stories, evocative objects and challenging interactives will introduce visitors to the type of fears faced by refugees as they undertake their journey to safety; Displacement - Refugees who flee their homes and life as they knew it have to make uncertain and often dangerous journeys. They need to make hard decisions about survival, returning home, or fleeing precarious temporary shelter to yet another country, often as unwelcome, stateless residents. Stories that bring out the best and worst in people will be explored, including an immersive look at life in the tents of a refugee camp; Refuge - Today, over 65 million people have been forcibly displaced from their homes. International organizations and individual nations grapple with the global challenge of offering refuge. How has Canada responded over the course of the 20th century? Canadians pride themselves in welcoming refugees, but there are dark chapters in Canada's response to various refugee crises. Visitors will see the different processes Canada has put in place in the 20th century to respond to refugees; Life in Canada - Refugees who make it to Canada face a range of perceptions by Canadians. Visitors will encounter a challenging range of views, labels, myths and stereotypes about refugees. Adapting to Canada is a daunting task as refugees grapple with both everyday challenges and identity conflicts. Canada has enjoyed success with settling past waves of refugees, sometimes with innovative sponsorship programs. Refugee stories of achievements and contributions to Canada will leave visitors informed, as well as inspired by the people who have found refuge in Canada.

Land Acknowledgments, Land Back, and the 10,000 Lakes: Indigenous History in Minnesota -August 11: What do land acknowledgments and debates over land back reveal about the making of Minnesota? Increasingly popular, land acknowledgments can be heard at the start of meetings to introductions of large sporting events, but what does this acknowledgment signify? Whose land is being acknowledged? How did relationships to this land transform over time? What is the connection of the land back movement? Indigenous history is Minnesota history. Today within the physical boundaries of the State of Minnesota exist seven Ojibwe band reservations, four Dakota communities, as well as thousands of Indigenous individuals living in small towns to large urban communities. Understanding how this modern-day configuration came to be is an important element of understanding the making of Minnesota. From early interactions between Dakota and Ojibwe Native nations to recent calls for economic, social, and environmental justice for Indigenous communities, Land Acknowledgments, Land Back, and the 10,000 Lakes: Indigenous History in Minnesota will survey the early history of interactions between Indigenous nations through the treaty era with the United States through the contemporary moment seeking to better understand how our collective past continues to shape our future. Dr. Jacob Jurss is an adjunct professor of United States and Indigenous history at the University of St. Thomas and Metropolitan State University and was a member of the St. Thomas Land Acknowledgment committee. His recently published article in The American Indian Quarterly "Relations Across the Land: Oiibwe and Dakota Interactions in the Indigenous Borderlands of the Western Great Lakes" explores the history of intertribal diplomacy and his currently book project is Bountiful Boundaries: Western Great Lakes Indigenous Borderlands and American Statecraft. Adapting Heritage Interpretation and Alternative Education for Public Archaeology in the Philippines - August 21: Tuklas Pilipinas Society is a non-profit organisation that aims to spread awareness of archaeological heritage in the Philippines through alternative education and public archaeology. The group has been adapting lessons from Interpret Europe for Heritage Interpretation strategies, which they have also integrated with their own ideas. This presentation discusses various examples of public archaeology conducted by Tuklas in the Philippines, that have been effective in engaging local communities in heritage management and preservation of their archaeological sites. The different projects of Tuklas have close involvement of the local and national government. With this, the group has been able to review the government's implementation and initiatives. As with most public archaeology efforts, Tuklas emphasizes the importance of close interaction between the local community, archaeologists, and heritage practitioners in the course of their work. Virtual Lecture- Exploring Cahokia: Native America's First City - August 29: Tales From the Field -EJF Lecture Series featuring Dr. Robin Beck. In his 1814 Views of Louisiana, a description of the vast new territory along the Mississippi River that President Thomas Jefferson had recently purchased from Napoleon, Henry Marie Brackenridge gives us the earliest published description of Cahokia, and indeed, one of the earliest references to any site that we would now identify as Mississippian. On recalling his first impression of Monks Mound, standing some 30 m high, he exclaims, "What a stupendous pile of earth!" Cahokia--located near modern-day Collinsville, Illinois, across the Mississippi River from St. Louis--still inspires fascination more than two centuries after Brackenridge first laid eyes on the massive monument at its heart. With more than 120 earthen mounds spread over some 15 km², Cahokia is orders of magnitude larger than any other archaeological site north of the Rio Grande. In 1964 the site was designated a National Historic Landmark, and in 1982 it became the tenth UNESCO World Heritage site in the United States. Since then, the Cahokia Museum and Interpretive Center has hosted nearly 12 million visitors. My talk will offer an overview of archaeology at Cahokia and provide a preview of my new project set to begin there next year. Robin Beck is Professor in the Department of Anthropology and Curator of Eastern North American Archaeology at the University of Michigan. His research interests include the archaeology and ethnohistory of complex societies in eastern North America and ethnohistory of complex societies in eastern North America and the Andes of Bolivia and Peru, early colonial encounters in what is now the southern United States, and the broader issues related to social change. Born and raised in Marion, North Carolina, Rob has directed or participated in fieldwork across much of the Eastern United States, as well as in Bolivia, Peru, and western China. He has co-directed research at the Berry site for more than 20 years and is launching a new project at Cahokia, Illinois, beginning in 2023. Register here.
