



Saskatoon: Enclosing Some Snapshots (until May 10, 2023) - Wanuskewin Heritage Park

In our East Gallery, Wanuskewin Galleries will be showcasing the photographs of James Brady, a Metis
man who is better known for his activism and being the driving forced behind the creation of settlements
in Alberta. Brady is well-known to the Indigenous communities he travelled to in Alberta and
Saskatchewan because he snapped photos as a way of keeping record of the people he met along the
way. These photos have been collected by the Glenbow Museum over the past 30 years. This exhibition
is co-created by Marcel Petit and curated by Paul Seeseequasis, who says, "It's a chance to see
snapshots of Indigenous life of four decades from one individual who travelled to many communities. I
think that is a very unique, and interesting perspective." James Brady's life (1908-1968) is intrinsically
linked to the history and politics of Métis communities in western Canada. While he is known foremost
as a political organizer and activist, Brady's snapshots are now an invaluable record of Indigenous life
and people in northern Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

Saskatoon: "Opikinawasowin" Growing Métis Children (until May 19, 2023) - Diefenbaker Canada Centre (101 Diefenbaker Place)

This collection features original artworks created by Métis artist Leah Marie Dorion on the theme of Opikinawasowin: Growing Métis Children. This series of collected artworks were created by Leah Marie Dorion from 2015-2021 and are a combination of children's book illustrations and other independent artworks from her private collection. This show reflects Métis cultural symbolism, worldview, characters, and teachings that are a hallmark of her artistic practice to tell the story of growing Métis children. The book illustrations are on loan from the Mann Art Gallery and were donated by Leah to the gallery to be properly curated and used for educational purposes. Her children's books are still published and available from Strong Nations Publishing in British Columbia. This collection also debuts artwork and artefacts from Leah's personal collection that was created to tell the story of Métis child rearing and development. Many of her illustrations and original artwork are deeply influenced by Métis Elders' teachings, which are available in her Master's Thesis (2010). May we all be inspired by the spirit of love that forms the heart of this art show and remember that we all have a role to play in "growing children". Leah Marie Dorion.

Saskatoon: Wanuskewin - A Sense of Place (until August 21, 2023) - Wanuskewin Heritage Park Spend time in the landscape at Wanuskewin Heritage Park and you will experience a natural ecological environment thousands of years in the making. It is a quintessential Plains environment, arid, flat, and incised by the Opimihaw Creek, a tributary of the South Saskatchewan River. This northern piece of the

essence of 'sense of place' at the core of the Wanuskewin landscape, a landscape where time has borne witness to a quiet connection between nature and the existence of humankind. To a group of twenty-one artists from across Saskatchewan, this prairie setting provided a venue for deeper connection and understanding of Wanuskewin Heritage Park's unique and historic Plains environment. During a series of artists' retreats held the spring, summer, and autumn of 2022, three small groups of artists met and emersed themselves in the Wanuskewin Heritage Park landscape. Through their personal choice of media, each artist created a visual response to their experience of the park. The 'WANUSKEWIN: A SENSE OF PLACE' exhibition has been curated from the artwork submitted by the twenty-one artists who participated in those artists' retreats. The exhibition artwork embodies ceramics, mixed media, painting, photography, fiber, and printmaking.

Saskatoon: Storied Objects (until July 2, 2023) - Remai Modern (102 Spadina Crescent East)

Métis people have always understood themselves and their culture through art. The grandmothers of
the Métis Nation adorned loved ones in exquisite beadwork, embroidery and quillwork. Every stitch
embodies care and strengthens relations. History and memory are encoded in form and material. In
tandem with oral tradition, objects act as memory devices for the recalling of stories. The term storied
objects aligns with the widely held belief in Indigenous cultures that objects have their own life force and
power. This exhibition draws on the scholarship of Métis art historian Sherry Farrell Racette. Describing
storied objects, she writes, "They remember. They remember us. They remember for us." Storied
Objects: Métis Art in Relation considers the deep continuity between contemporary and historic Métis
arts. The artists in the exhibition adapt, translate and transform ancient media and practices into new
forms. Their works draw on the narrative power of objects to communicate knowledge of self,
community and place. Storied objects are embedded with relations and are often considered relatives
themselves. Recognizing this, artworks in the exhibition create spaces for visiting and storytelling that
will be activated by programs throughout the exhibition run. Visit remaimodern.org/calendar for

Saskatoon: On Safari Downtown Saskatoon Tour - With fossils and more (Ongoing) - Online

This guide, created by the Museum of Natural Sciences at the University of Saskatchewan, will help you
to find all kinds of surprises in downtown Saskatoon. We will see many animal and plant stone carvings,
and there are other animals and plants hiding inside the stones! Many of the buildings use a special
type of limestone known as Tyndall Stone, a sedimentary rock that was built up over time trapping the
remains of animals and plants which have been preserved as fossils. Although some of the buildings
downtown are already 100 years old, the stones used for these buildings are much older. Tyndall Stone
is the remains of an ancient sea floor from 450,000,000 years ago. Now that's history! Check out the

Saskatoon: Treaty Learning Journey - Four Sessions (May 3, 10, 17 & 24) - 315 Avenue M South Join Reconciliation Saskatoon for the Treaty Learning Journey Workshop by Office of the Treaty Commissioner. Indigenous People have been on this land for time immemorial. They are the original inhabitants and protectors of this land now known as Canada. For thousands of years prior to European (Newcomers) contact, what is now Canada is populated by many well-developed Indigenous nations. Prior to contact, Indigenous People had Treaties amongst their nations that assisted in sharing the land and resources for hunting, fishing, trapping and gathering purposes. As more newcomers came to settle on this land, the British Crown needed to ensure their access to the land. Treaties are to ensure the peaceful relations and continued livelihood of both parties – the Indigenous people and the Newcomers, and they are the foundational building blocks of Canada. Each nation had a responsibility to uphold the terms of Treaty. Upon agreement, the Indigenous Chiefs/Leaders assumed their way of life would be

of Treaties, and breaches of Treaty. You will also learn about current Indigenous circumstances such as, but not limited to: the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action, the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP) and myths and misconceptions. Saskatoon: Saskatoon Through the Lens of Helen Schrader (May 19, 2023) - 3130 Laurier Drive Drop-in and explore the history of Saskatoon through the lens of the Local History Room's photograph collection. Regina: Canadian Food History - Calling All Women (May 24, 2023) - Online

Join Kelsey Lonie on a Canadian Food History program. Discover how Prairie women met the farm labor shortages in British Columbia during WWII. This program is conducted through Zoom. Register to receive a reminder, the evaluation, and any other resources. Click the Link to join. During the Second World War, thousands of women stepped into roles previously held by men. While you may be familiar with "Rosie the Riveter," the iconic symbol of women factory workers across the nation, less is known about the women who rolled up their sleeves and contributed to Canada's food production. Between 1943-1946, hundreds of women from Saskatchewan traveled by train to British Columbia under a Government wartime program. They lived together in camps and hostels during the summer months, working on fruit and berry farms where extreme labor shortages existed. Using newspaper articles, archival research, oral history, and letters, Kelsey will share her research on the history of this program and highlight one of the many ways that women from Saskatchewan contributed to the Second World War. Presenter Information: Kelsey Lonie is conducting thesis research in the History Department at the University of Regina. Kelsey is also a classroom teacher and has always been passionate about the intersection of history and education. 
Saskatoon: Local History Book Club (May 25, 2023) - 311 23 Street East

A Geography of Blood. Bestselling author Candace Savage embarks on a profound and dramatic journey through the eloquent landscape of southwestern Saskatchewan. When Candace Savage and her partner buy a house in the romantic little town of Eastend, she has no idea what awaits her. At first she enjoys exploring the area around their new home, including the boyhood haunts of the celebrated American writer Wallace Stegner, the backroads of the Cypress Hills, the dinosaur skeletons at the T.Rex Discovery Centre, the fossils to be found in the dust-dry hills. She also revels in her encounters with the wild inhabitants of this mysterious land -- two coyotes in a ditch at night, their eyes glinting in the dark; a deer at the window; a cougar pussy-footing it through a gully a few minutes' walk from town. But as Savage explores further, she uncovers a darker reality -- a story of cruelty and survival set in the still-recent past -- and finds that she must reassess the story she grew up with as the daughter, granddaughter and great-granddaughter of prairie homesteaders.



The Legacy of New Deal Programs to Northern Arizona and Southwest Archaeology - May 15:

Presented by by Peter J. Pilles, Jr. During the 1930s, federal New Deal programs financed and supported a number of archaeological projects in northern Arizona. Within National Parks and Monuments, surveys and excavations were undertaken so that people could see archaeological sites and visitor centers were constructed to display and interpret archaeology for the public. Several major expeditions by the Museum of Northern Arizona were also supported by New Deal programs. Excavations from 1933 to 1939 were directed by professional archaeologists employed by the Museum with laborers and students financed by the U.S. Civil Works Administration, Federal Emergency Relief Administration, and the Works Progress Administration. This work took place during a time when little was known about the prehistory of northern Arizona and the field of Southwestern archaeology was relatively new. The Museum's excavations formed the basis for numerous publications by Harold S. Colton and his colleagues that greatly influenced the next 80 years of archaeological research and National Park Service interpretation. This presentation explores the relationship of archaeological research conducted by the Museum with federal New Deal Programs and its enduring legacy to the archaeological profession and the American public. Peter J. Pilles, Jr. received his BA degree from

Coconino National Forest, his present position. He has presented over 70 papers and authored 50 publications which reflect his specialty areas of central and northern Arizona prehistory, rock art, ceramics, cultural resource management, and public archaeology. His most recent publications, coming out this year, are The Crane Site and V-Bar-V Ranch, co-authored with Ken Zoll, and The Legacy of New Deal Programs to the Archaeology of Northern Arizona, co-authored with Jeanne Sevens. Peter has been involved with various site development and interpretive plans and has been an advisor to the National Park Service, the State of Arizona, the Museum of Northern Arizona, and the Brazilian Institute for Cultural Heritage. An adjunct professor at Northern Arizona University, he has been an instructor in archaeological law enforcement for the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center and has taught courses in rock art conservation and management for the American Rock Art Research Association, the Rock Art Special Interest Group of the Society for American Archaeology, the J. Paul Getty Conservation Institute, the Instituto Brasileiro do Patrimonio Cultural, and at the VI Simposio Internacional de Arte Rupestre, San Salvador de Jujuy, Argentina. He has also served on the Board of Trustees of the Museum of Northern Arizona. He has received awards from the Governor of Arizona, the Secretary of Agriculture, the U.S. Forest Service, Tuzigoot National Monument, the Arizona Archaeological and Historical Society, the American Rock Art Research Association, the Arizona Archaeology Advisory Commission, the Arizona Preservation Foundation, and the Hopi Tribe.
